RE: Urgently Needed State COVID Relief and Charitable Nonprofits

Dear Kentucky Legislators:

When nonprofits are hurting, the Kentuckians we serve are hurting. The Kentucky General Assembly has a history of understanding the critical role and importance of the nonprofit sector – **the Commonwealth's fourth largest employer**. The undersigned organizations seek your support of urgently needed COVID-19 relief that will enable charitable nonprofits to continue contributing to the Commonwealth's relief and recovery. **The attached proposal outlines solutions that will help protect the essential services critical to meeting the needs of Kentuckians, protect jobs, and advance Kentucky - specifically, we urge the General Assembly to include \$150 million in relief funds for nonprofit organizations in the state budget.**

Charitable nonprofits are the backbone of our communities. **We employ over 150,000 Kentuckians, following the manufacturing, retail, and accommodation/food service industries** – and are suffering as much or more, with the added risk of the loss of our ability to provide services that impact the health, safety, vitality, and quality of life in communities across the Commonwealth.

There is no one-size-fits-all way to quantify the pandemic's impact on nonprofits. Some organizations have experienced significant revenue losses and been forced to lay off employees; some have been "hibernating" and look to provide services again very soon; and others have been forced to shut their doors. Others have experienced significant increases in the demand for services and as a result, have faced significant increases in their expenses. Regardless of these differences, one thing is certain – **Kentucky will not fully recover and thrive beyond COVID-19 without a vibrant nonprofit sector.**

Federal relief programs have been a lifeline for some, however many organizations did not receive federal relief and even if they were able to secure relief funds, those funds are exhausted. Year-end legislation and the relief legislation expected soon are not enough to ensure our most vulnerable neighbors will continue to receive services. **Relief funds in Kentucky's budget will help ensure that the over 154,000 Kentuckians employed by nonprofits pre-pandemic can remain in or return to the workforce.**

Charitable nonprofits have risen to meet this crisis, stretching beyond reasonable measures to advance our missions despite unimaginable obstacles. And we face incredible challenges in 2021 and beyond. **The undersigned nonprofits urge the General Assembly to protect services, protect jobs, and invest in advancing Kentucky by including \$150 million in relief funds for Kentucky's nonprofits in the state budget, as is outlined in the attached proposal.** Relief is essential if nonprofits are to continue being the force for good that Kentuckians need today and will rely on in the days ahead.

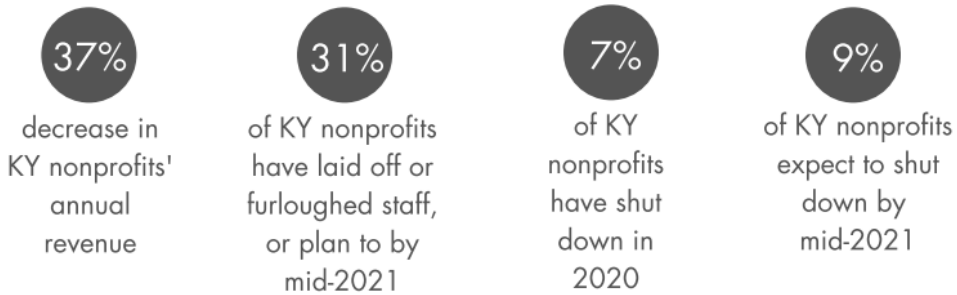

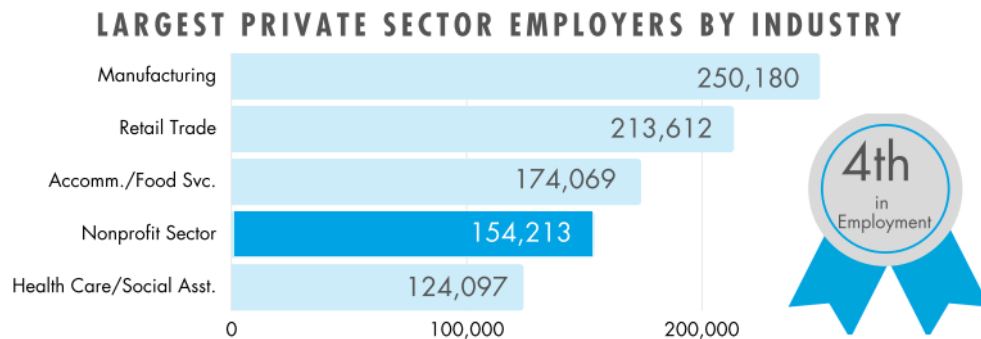
When Nonprofits Suffer, Kentuckians Suffer

Immediate Issues Facing Kentucky's Nonprofit Sector¹:



- \$201 Million: Lost Revenue
- \$14 Million: Increased Expenses
- 39%: Have Exhausted or with Less than 3 Months of Cash Reserves

Urgently Needed Relief for Kentucky's Nonprofits

Protect Services ♦ Protect Jobs ♦ Advance Kentucky

Relief Funds

- ⇒ Provide a \$150 million relief fund available to all 501 (c)3 charitable nonprofits operating in Kentucky.
- ⇒ All relief from this program is capped at \$50,000 per organization.
- ⇒ Any 501 (c)3 nonprofit is eligible to receive \$1000/employee (FT and PT). Eligible nonprofits serving those most impacted by the pandemic (those identified in HB 191's \$20 million pool) would be eligible to receive \$2000/employee. The grant is determined by the number of employees on payroll at the time of application and again, is capped at \$50,000.
- ⇒ Any organization with fewer than 50 employees would be eligible for funding up to the \$50,000 cap if they can demonstrate their largest earned revenue loss or increase in expenses in one quarter (comparing 2019 to 2020).
- ⇒ Eligibility will be open first to organizations who have not received federal relief, excluding Paycheck Protection Program and Economic Injury Disaster Loans. After a two-week application period, eligibility will be open to any nonprofit.
- ⇒ Administering funds: Direct relief is needed in the hands of nonprofits as soon as possible. Given the increased demand for services and/or decreased staffing, nonprofits do not have the capacity for lengthy or complex application processes.

Unemployment Insurance

- ⇒ Include relief specifically for reimbursing, self-insured nonprofit employers in any funds used to replenish the state unemployment insurance trust fund.

Charitable Giving Tax Incentives

- ⇒ Implement an above-the-line charitable giving tax incentive to stimulate private philanthropic investments in nonprofits' longer-term relief and recovery.

Kentucky Nonprofit Network, the state association of nonprofits, stands ready to help communicate relief opportunities to Kentucky nonprofits. We request that the legislation include language indicating that the Public Protection Cabinet shall consult KNN when deciding how to effectively administer and implement relief programs for 501 (c)3 charitable nonprofits.
